Lucas and Bia at the Paris Olympic Games

Paris: Beatriz Tavares and Lucas Verthein are in the world's top 15

The Paris Olympic Games began three years ago for the CBR. As one cycle ends, another begins. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, the Olympics held in France had less time to plan and work together across the entire international Olympic community.

For Brazilian rowing, it was no different.

There were tryouts, international competitions, training camps in Europe, a lot of planning, and participation in World Championships and World Cups. We qualified two boats for Paris, twice as many as the Tokyo cycle. Our team, composed of Lucas Verthein and Beatriz Tavares, was training in Varese, Italy, in the months leading up to the Paris Games.

Lucas Verthein, the reigning Pan American champion in men's single sculls, represented Brazil in his second Olympics, and Beatriz Tavares made her debut at the Paris Games. Our Bia is the eighth Brazilian rower to qualify for the Olympics in the history of the sport. Both rowers won the Continental Pre-Olympics held in Rio de Janeiro in March.

The Continental Pre-Olympics have been held and organized by World Rowing since 1996, in preparation for the Atlanta Olympic Games. In previous Olympics, countries selected their representative boats based on their own criteria and internal national selection processes.

After Atlanta, the rules of the Games changed, and we began competing with other countries for limited spots to even dream of participating in the Olympics. Beatriz and Lucas left Brazil as champions of the Americas and represented us very well. The rowers competed in competitive races and gave their best throughout the competition.

Now all eyes are on the Los Angeles Olympics, where we'll see the debut of the coastal rowing event: the Beach Sprint. The new rules for future trials are still unknown, but more changes are expected for the international rowing community.

Thank you Bia Tavares and Lucas Verthein for representing us so well! Au Revoir Paris, welcome Los Angeles!

3.1 UNIFIED YOUNG TALENT CBI

The Brazilian Unified Interclub Championship for Young Talents arrived in full force at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas! The brabinhos fought intensely for spots in the grand finals.

The competition took place in 2024 on the Olympic track at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas, in Rio de Janeiro, and promises to heat up the Rio summer even more.

There were 265 rowers under 18 from 22 clubs across the country. Flamengo, the host club, had the largest registered team, with 71 rowers. Three Uruguayan teams also participated in the competition as guests.

This competition took place with the support of Nebar, as most of the participating athletes are part of the project, demonstrating the importance of the work developed throughout the 2024 season. Nutritionist Erika

Santinoni and physiotherapist Rafael Jacob take advantage of the athletes' acclimatization days to conduct in-person consultations and closely monitor the rowers' performance.

National coordinator Roque Zimmermann is also present to observe the performance of his rowers from Clube Náutico America and other Nebar athletes, carried out with the support of the Ministry of Sports. and Senator Carlos Portinho (RJ).

This competition focuses on the youth teams, representing the first national championship for many young athletes. Supporting them in a healthy environment is crucial for the development and renewal of our sport. The youth academy is very strong, and we have the privilege of following the emerging names in rowing on the national stage during the Brazilian Young Talent Championship.

3.2 CBI BEACH SPRINT

The success of the Brazilian Coastal Rowing

Championships is a stimulus for holding the World

Championships of the new Olympic sport in the country in 2025, our first national coastal rowing championship,

The international competition will take place between October 23 and 26 next year, at Praia do Flamengo, in Rio de Janeiro

The first edition of the Brazilian Coastal Rowing Championship concluded this Sunday, the 8th, at Jurerê Internacional beach in Florianópolis, Santa Catarina. The event showcased the new Olympic discipline that will be featured at the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games. Flamengo was the overall champion, winning two of the three categories: Junior and Senior. Team Beach Sprint was the overall winner in the Masters category.

Now, Brazil turns its attention to hosting the World Championship of the sport, which will be held in Rio de Janeiro, between October 23 and 26, 2025. Flamengo Beach will be the stage for the first

international competition after the announcement of the inclusion of beach rowing in the Olympic Program.

"This was our first national coastal rowing championship, and the results were fantastic. We saw the clubs' involvement, the camaraderie, and everyone helping each other. This is very important for our sport. The overall spectacle was fantastic," said Magali Moreira, president of the Brazilian Rowing Confederation, who also emphasized the importance of holding next year's World Championships.

"This event served as a test for next year's world championship. We learned a lot. Bringing this event to Brazil, the first world championship since the announcement of backstroke rowing at the Olympic Games, is a great achievement. It's a very dynamic sport, which the public can follow closely, cheering on the athletes. This creates a lot of excitement."

We want to take a strong team to Los Angeles and, who knows, bring a medal back to Brazil," said Magali.

3.3 UNIFIED CBI FOR ROWING AND PARA ROWING



The biggest competition on the Brazilian calendar began on Tuesday (15) with the first day of qualifying rounds for the USP race. The short boats arrived in large numbers and the skiffs and two helmsmen opened the championship with a flourish.

Competitive events, clubs from all over Brazil. Six days of competition in total! The first three days were the qualifiers, and starting on Friday (18), the fight for a place on the podium began with three days of finals. There were events in all categories, including para-rowing, with gender equality. There were 344 athletes registered, 60 qualifying events, including the repechages, and 25 clubs from all regions of Brazil. There were 99 events in total during the six days of the Championship.

Flamengo, despite playing away from home, fielded the strongest team in this competition and took home the title with a significant advantage over the second-place team. Botafogo came with a full squad, including two Paris 2024 representatives: Lucas Verthein and Beatriz Tavares, and secured a commanding second place. Pinheiros, third-place and host of the event, showed confidence in their team and has two representatives from the last Paralympic Games on their team: Claudia Santos and Jairo Klug.

No one wanted to be left out of the medal race, and the northern and northeastern states came out in full force. Special mention goes to Crossrowing, the only representative from the Federal District. The clubs from Rio Grande do Sul couldn't be left out, arriving at this CBI demonstrating the strength and resilience of the people of Rio Grande do Sul. Several rowers, who helped in the search and rescue after the state's biggest environmental tragedy, which occurred earlier this year, are competing in this CBI, such as Alef Fontoura (Pinheiros), Piedro Xavier (GNU), and Evaldo Becker (Flamengo).

Pará's traditional rivals, Clube do Remo, Tuna Lusa and Paysandu, representatives of the northern region in this CBI,

In total, 99 events were contested over six days of competition. A veritable aquatic marathon took place on the USP course. This Unified Brazilian Championship promised plenty of rowing action and excitement for the fans. For those unable to attend the USP course, the three days of finals were broadcast on the Brazilian Olympic Channel, with commentary by Pan American medalist Dr. Renan Koplewski.

3.4 BRAZILIAN MASTER CHAMPIONSHIP

Three days of competition for the main Master category championship promoted by CBR for the 2024 season!

There were more than 200 athletes gathered in São Paulo, on the USP Olympic track from all over the country. The states are very well represented!

Corinthians Paulista was the overall champion of the event with a total of 175 medals, followed by Cepeusp with 29 and Clube Guajará with 28. The São Paulo club had significant reinforcements during the competition, such as Paralympic athletes Alina Dumas and Juscelino Silva, known as Birigui, who qualified for Paris 2024.

The first South American champion in the history of Brazilian women's rowing, Ana Helena Pucceti, also competed for Corinthians, as did Santa Catarina native Odilon Maia Martins, the world's most experienced athlete at the ripe old age of 94! The Brasília delegation also attended, as did the president

Lília Oliveira was one of the hungriest in the championship, rowing 19 races!

Two other rowers from Brasília tied for the most competitions in this Brazilian championship, rowing 23 races each!

Carmem Proença and Luciana Bex showed that Brazil's capital is up to date with training! And there was a Pan-American champion proving that rowing is ageless! Gilberto Gehardt, from Amares, rowed in 8 events!

A more than honorable mention to the athletes of Grémio Náutico União, some rowing for Corinthians, from Rio Grande do Sul who attended and competed on the USP track, putting on a show of resilience and fair play!

The Brazilian Master Championship says goodbye to the 2024 season and is already missed.

Thank you to the athletes from across the country for attending. See you next year!

4.1 PRE-OLYMPIC ROWING

Brazilian rowing will have two representatives at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. Beatriz Tavares and Lucas Verthein won the Single Sculls events at the Americas Pre-Olympic Games, held in Rio de Janeiro, and secured their place at the world's largest multi-sport event.

The first Brazilian athlete to compete on the final day of regattas at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas, Beatriz Tavares gave her main rival, Kenia Lechuga of Mexico, gold medalist at the Santiago 2023 Pan American Games, no chance.

"It was great to win at home, because I always lost when I participated in international competitions here. I thought about quitting rowing many times, as I never imagined I would actually compete in the Olympics. So, I made a deal with myself today that my only option would be to win, and it worked," said the rower.

Bia also dedicated her qualification to her family, especially her grandparents, who are present in Lagoa and always accompanied her to training and competitions.

When she leaves for France, Beatriz will have her club teammate Lucas Verthein by her side, who was crowned

champion in the Men's Single Sculls.

"It's a great pleasure to be able to represent Brazil in the Olympic Games, and I'll do my best to compete for a medal. My goal is to focus on improving my technical and physiological aspects. I still have a lot to improve, and I'd be worried if I finished this competition without anything to improve on. I'm only 25, and I want to go much further, helping to bring rowing back to the mainstream, as it was in the 1980s."

In the other finals of the day, both in the Double Skiff Lightweight category, Isabelle Falck (Flamengo) and Manu Abreu (Botafogo) finished in fourth place, in the regatta won by the Argentine duo, while Evaldo Becker (Flamengo) and Pedro Tuchtenhagen (Grêmio Náutico União) came in third in the race that saw the Chileans as victors.

Rowers from the Americas still have another chance to qualify for Paris 2024. Between May 19 and 21, in Lucerne (Switzerland), the world qualifier will take place, which will distribute two places in each of the events that make up the Games program.

4.2 WORLD MASTERS

A super team made up of reporters from 18 Brazilian clubs from all regions of the country transformed the World Rowing Masters World Championship, held in Brandenburg this year, into a real dance!

Corinthians was the overall and men's champion of the event! But other teams also performed well and made their presence felt on the podium! Aldo Luz, Riachuelo, and Minas Brasília won gold medals for their teams.

Odilon Maia Martins, the most experienced athlete in the Brazilian delegation, was honored at the event for being part of a select club of athletes in the 90+ category! Honorable mention goes to rowers Celio Dias Amorim, Frederico Colodetti, and Erly B. Neto for achieving the highest podium place in the single sculls in their respective categories.

Erly Neto was the athlete with the most gold medals among Brazilians: four.

Super Juscelino Silva, better known as Birigui, didn't rest! He returned from the Paralympics straight to the World Cup in Germany, where he made his mark and won his medal in the fourth round with Corinthians!

Congratulations to athletes Ingrid B Santos, Samia N.

Sulaiman and Maria de Lourdes Proença won gold medals in two double scull events. Rowers Marcelo Pereira Macedo and Carlos Alberto de Melo Dutra,

who reached the podium representing Aldo Luz, Riachuelo, and the southern region of the country!

Congratulations to each of you who demonstrated such great sportsmanship and fair play in this World Championship!

and GNU who showed all the resilience of

4.3 WORLD BEACH SPRINT CHAMPIONSHIPS



The World Rowing Beach Sprint World Championships took place in Genoa from September 13th to 15th. Bad weather, wind, and strong waves almost prevented the championship from taking place. Our athletes faced adverse conditions, including a day's delay during the races, and rule changes throughout the event.

This was the largest Brazilian team CBR has sent to the World Championships in this sport to date. Beach Sprint is the new Olympic discipline and will be part of the Los Angeles program in 2028. The new discipline has grown exponentially and promises to make history in this new cycle that began with the end of the Paris Games. For the first time, we will have two different rowing disciplines during the Games.

Our team was represented by four boats and nine athletes, plus three members of the Technical Committee. These were days of struggle, overcoming opponents and adverse weather.

Our athletes did well, advancing from the qualifying phase (time trials) to the knockout phase (when a boat competes directly with a single opponent). Unfortunately, our Thalita Soares (C1xW) was the only one not to qualify, as the event rules changed.

Thalita would have had a chance to recover from the Time Trial in the repechage, but due to bad weather and strong waves, this stage of the competition was suspended. The sea was the Brazilians' biggest tormentor. The first-place finishers, Kyssia and Renato Cataldo (C2xMix), posted the fastest time in the qualifying round, but suffered a severe blow, capsizing their boat in the final meters of the race.

Still, our warriors didn't give up. Kyssia remained under observation and returned to compete in the round of 16. Despite their efforts, ocean currents forced the Brazilians off their path, and the duo was placed in the round of 16 against Australia. David de Souza (C1xM) also suffered the adverse weather conditions and was eliminated in the quarterfinals.

Our C4xMix, comprised of veteran athletes and newcomers, achieved the best Brazilian finish in the competition, even finishing among the top eight in the world. The boat, composed of Vangelys Reinke, Pedro Henrique, Fernanda Nunes, Dayane Pacheco, and helmsman João Ferreira, flew low in the early stages and performed well.

4.4 UNIFIED SOUTH AMERICAN

Brazil concluded its participation in the South American Rowing Championships in style. On Wednesday morning, the 20th, the country's rowers won 11 medals: 5 gold, 4 silver, and 2 bronze, in 14 races held on Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas in Rio de Janeiro.

Considering the two days of competition finals and the results of the Continental Pre-Olympics, which were counted in the overall medal table, Brazil reached the podium 26 times, with 11 golds, 9 silvers and 6 bronzes, finishing as runner-up in the event, behind only Chile, which took 14 diamonds.

"Brazil showed its strength in the South American Championship, with excellent results in all categories: adult, junior and Paralympic. We reached the podium in most of the events and ended the competition with good prospects for the rest of the work," said the president of the Brazilian Rowing Confederation, Magali Moreira.

One of the most celebrated victories by Brazilians on this last day of the South American Championship was that of the Four Skiff, formed by Pedro Tuchtenhagen, Olavo Soares, Evaldo Becker and Gabriel Oliveira, who recorded a time of 6:03.33, beating the Argentines by about three seconds.

"The four of us had never competed together, only trained twice. But we overcame the lack of coordination with a winning mentality. The stroke clicked right away, and we won the gold medal," celebrated Gabriel Oliveira.

Jennifer Almeida, 18, also has plenty of reasons to celebrate at this South American Championship.

After winning the Double Sculls with Brenda Madruga last Tuesday, she won the Single Sculls, both in the junior category.

"This is a very tough test, especially in this heat that we have in Rio de Janeiro. But this result is the fruit of a lot of work, dedication and training, together with my coaches", highlighted the young athlete.

Qualified for the Paris 2024 Games after winning the Pre-Olympics, Lucas Verthein returned to Lagoa to compete in the Double Sculls alongside another young talent: Marcelo Almeida. The victory came in the photo finish against the Uruguayans, with a 15-hundredths advantage.

"We worked hard and dreamed a lot to get to this moment and achieve this achievement. I'm very happy about the partnership with Marcelinho. We rowed very well, delivered a great race, with excitement from start to finish."

4.5 I WORLD CUP

Brazilian rowing had a lot to celebrate at the start of 2024! After qualifying two boats for the Paris Olympic Games in the Continental Qualification Regatta, held at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas in March of this year, and strong results in the CSAR Unified South American Championship, Lucas Verthein is the ninth best in the world in the 1st World Cup, held in Varese, Italy.

The Brazilian put on a show in Italian waters, rowing hard and narrowly missing out on advancing to the A final of the competition in his semifinal. Lucas's event, the men's single scull (M1X), was the event with the highest number of entrants: 30! The athlete finished third in his qualifying round and went straight to the quarterfinals, where he finished second, losing only to the world champion, German Oliver Zeidler.

In the semifinals, our rower came in fourth, less than a second behind the third-placed

Belgian Tim Brys, thus moving on to Final B.

Lucas showed immense evolution and maturity compared to his results in the same competition last season. In 2023, Lucas finished thirteenth overall, first in the C final.

Lucas Verthein demonstrates that his evolution continues and that the Brazilian rower will bring us much joy in the 2024 season. The athlete, who brought an unprecedented medal to Brazil at the 2023 Santiago Games and broke a 36-year drought, starts 2024 on a high note: stamping his passport to Paris, adding two more gold medals at South American Games to his record and finishing the 1st World Cup in third place in the B final, ninth place overall.

Our rower has already given sufficient proof that he is rowing among the best in the world, at the highest level.

4.6 III CUP AMERICA BEACH SPRINT

The Brazilian team put on a real show at the Copa America de Remo Costal, organized by World Rowing, held from April 23rd to 28th on Chorrillos Beach, Peru. The competition brings together all the countries of the Americas and is in its third edition. Our six athletes traveled to Lima and competed in three Beach Sprint events and five Endurance events.

BEACH SPRINT: The first event was the Beach Sprint, which will make its Olympic debut in Los Angeles 2028. Our athletes in the mixed double (C2xMix) performed very well, winning the silver medal. Fernanda Nunes (Vasco) and Pedro Henrique Ferreira (Botafogo), in a new boat formation, faced their opponents and arrived fighting for the silver medal.

Our women's single sculls (C1xW) representative, Kissya Cataldo (Botafogo), also competed for a medal but finished a creditable fourth in her first Coastal Rowing competition. In the men's single sculls (C1xM), it was David Farias' turn to represent the Brazilian National Team. After a very difficult race, our athlete reached the quarterfinals.

ENDURANCE: After the Beach Sprint finals, the America's Cup moved on to the second Coastal Rowing discipline: Endurance or Crossing.

These races were divided into two days: the first day with 6k (six-kilometer) races and the second day with 23k (twenty-three-kilometer) races. These races take place in open water, and the boats are the largest in Coastal Rowing: the four-skiff (C4x). Because it's such a long course, all boats have a coxswain on their teams.

On the first day of Endurance, the team competed in two events. In the first final of the day, we got off to a great start! We won bronze in the mixed four sculls (C4xMix+), formed by: Barbara Santos

(Paysandu), Fernanda Nunes, David de Souza, Pedro Henrique and Vangelys Reinke (Flamengo), returning from injury and surgery, as helmsman.

In the second final of the Endurance 6k, with a boat from Brazil, we went on a mixed boat with an athlete from Peru. Rowers David Farias, Vangelys Reinke, Pedro Henrique, and Barbara Santos, as coxswain, brought Brazil its first gold medal. In fact, after that event, we only won gold medals until the end of the competition.

In the final event of the III America's Coastal Rowing Cup, the longest challenge of all was the 23k Endurance. Our rowers, once again, competed in two races and put on a show in Peruvian waters. Our representative at the 2016 Rio Games, Fernanda Nunes, demonstrated her excellent adaptation to the Coastal Rowing competition, winning a gold medal in the women's four sculls (C4xW+) alongside other North American athletes.

The final event of the competition, featuring Brazilian representatives, is the men's four sculls (C4xM+), another showpiece for our athletes. The hard-stopping trio of the costal: David Farias, Pedro Henrique, and Vangelys Pereira, led by Barbara Santos, coxswain, along with another athlete from Mexico, took the top spot on the podium, bringing home another gold medal!

4.7 II WORLD CUP AND PRE-OLYMPIC

Our Olympic representatives in Paris 2024 and our five-time Paralympic representative Claudia Santos competed on Lake Rotsee in Lucerne at the end of May in the second World Rowing World Cup, organized by World Rowing. The competition is the Brazilian para-athlete's last international engagement before the Games in the French capital.

Brazilian Olympic athletes Lucas Verthein and Beatriz Tavares continue their training season in Europe to compete in the third stage of the World Cup, held between June 14th and 16th in Poznan.

Claudia Santos, known as Claudinha, was the highest-ranked Brazilian. The rower competed in the 1xW PR1 and earned her spot in the A final in the repechage, finishing sixth overall. The World Cup served as an opportunity for the athlete to adjust her training and plans for the Paralympics, which take place from July 28th to September 8th.

The rowers of the four with the PR3 Mixed helmsman, who stamped their passport to Paris in the last qualifying regatta for the Paralympic Games, which took place a week earlier, also in Switzerland, join Claudinha to represent us very well in the French capital!

Our Olympic representatives finished the II World Cup in the C final of the event. Lucas Verthein finished first in his 1xM final, taking thirteenth place overall, and Bia Tavares took third place in her event, finishing fifteenth in the 1xW. The two boats from this competition will be the ones the Brazilians will row in Paris 2024, and, like Claudinha, our athletes' final placings will serve as a learning experience for adjusting boats, strategies, and training leading up to the Paris Games.

4.8 III WORLD CUP

From June 14th to 16th, the Third Stage of the World Rowing World Cup, promoted by World Rowing, took place in Poznań, Poland. The annual Championship is always divided into three phases, and this year, our Olympic representatives, Lucas Verthein and Beatriz Tavares, participated in the event.

Our athletes stayed in Europe after the second stage of the World Cup, held in Lucena at the end of May, training in Gavirate, Italy, and from there, they continued on to Poland.

This season was planned as preparation for the Brazilian rowers for Paris 2024. The goal is to increase their preparation and provide ideal conditions for Bia and Lucas to practice rowing.

The Brazilians have already shown results this season in Italy. Beatriz Tavares, who finished the second leg of the World Cup in the C final, placed her boat in the B final and the tenth most

fastest in the world in the event that will represent us at the Olympics, the women's single sculls (1xW). Lucas Verthein, the only Brazilian athlete who competed in all three phases of the 2024 World Cups, confirmed his evolution and, because he is, the number one in the current Brazilian ranking.

Lucas reached the A final of the men's single sculls (1xM), Brazil's best result in the event's history at World Championships and World Cups. For the first time, we reached the grand final of the event our athlete will row in Paris. The Brazilian rower finished sixth overall, demonstrating significant improvement since the beginning of the season.

Our athletes' next major competition was the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. Lucas and Bia still had many kilometers to cover and many hours of training, but we know they were very well prepared to represent us and give their best in the biggest multi-sport competition on the planet!

EVALDO BECKER AND PEDRO XAVIER

The great life lesson of Evaldo Mathias Becker and Pedro Xavier

In a response to the CBR, World Rowing regrets the decision and hopes to soon be able to assist and work with our athletes Evaldo Mathias Becker and Pedro Xavier. The Confederation, with the support of the Brazilian Olympic Committee, submitted a request for the Brazilian National Team's rowers to compete in Paris 2024.

The request was based on the concept of Olympism and humanitarian aid that our athletes demonstrated during the greatest environmental tragedy in the history of Rio Grande do Sul, which caused rowers to withdraw from competing for an Olympic spot to help families in Rio Grande do Sul affected by the floods.

In an excerpt from the letter, the World Rowing President states: "We deeply sympathize with the devastating impact of the floods on Evaldo, Pedro, their families, and the Brazilian rowing community at large. Their decision to stay and support their loved ones and community members, rather than pursue their Olympic goals and dreams, truly embodies the spirit of altruism, solidarity, and the core values of the Olympic Movement. Regrettably, as much as we admire and respect their courageous choice and the exemplary spirit they demonstrated, we cannot grant additional quota places for Paris 2024. The Olympic qualification process is rigorous, and maintaining its integrity is crucial to the fairness and credibility of the Games."

The rowers of the Brazilian National Team Remo, Evaldo Mathias Becker and Pedro Xavier, gave up their Olympic dreams to stay in Rio Grande do Sul, after

According to Civil Defense data, heavy rains devastated 96% of the state. The state was inundated by torrential rains from late April until mid-May; more than half a million people are homeless, and 147, according to the latest count, have lost their lives.

The athletes, who competed together in the lightweight men's double sculls at the Rio de Janeiro Olympic Qualifying Tournament in March, were hoping to participate in the next Olympic qualifying round in Lucerne, Switzerland, at the end of May. The category was removed from the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games program, making Paris their last chance to qualify their boat in the category.

But the rowers joined other athletes and people from across Brazil who distributed aid and used boats to rescue neighbors, strangers, and abandoned pets. "Our race is here now. I couldn't travel and leave my daughter in a shelter," Evaldo said in an interview with the BBC.

Evaldo and Pedro were in the final stages of preparation for Lucerna, but were directly affected when floods hit Grêmio Náutico União, the club where the athletes' boat was stationed, in the capital Porto Alegre. The rowers trained until the eve of the rains, when the tragedy began.

"Our training center was badly affected, we lost our boat, oars and

several other essential pieces of equipment for our preparation, and in light of this, our focus shifted to helping the people of Rio Grande do Sul, our people. We became acutely aware of the scale of the catastrophe we were facing here in Rio Grande do Sul, seeing thousands of families displaced, people being rescued from the floods, children, friends, family—all suffering greatly. It was at that moment that we decided to stay," the rowers explain.

The pair, along with eight other rowers, worked tirelessly to help with relief efforts—even though some of them lost everything in the floods. "We are rescuing victims,

animals, helping homeless families, and with the logistics of donations," explains Evaldo. "It's very painful and sad to see our family and friends go through this, people completely losing everything they had. This flood devastated our entire state, taking away dreams, plans, and lives."

"The flood also took away our dreams, our expectations, and our hopes. It was a difficult decision, but we are at peace with our decision and focused on helping and serving our people," says Pedro.

Evaldo and Pedro's life lesson goes far beyond the rowing lanes. The CBR stands by its athletes in their decision and regrets that their long-awaited spot at Paris 2024 was not forthcoming.

6.1 NEBAR: PROGRAM ROWERS DO WELL IN THIS CBI

NEBAR is the Federal Government's program to promote youth rowing teams focused on high-performance training. This is the second year of this program, and we're seeing positive results!

Of the 344 rowers participating in the Brazilian Unified Rowing Championship, held in October at the University of São Paulo (USP), 59 athletes are members of the Nebar program. The project's rowers, which are coordinated nationally by Roque Zimmerman, competed in 144 events in total, winning 89 medals, including gold, silver, and bronze.

Honorable mention goes to the youngest athlete in the competition, Clara Tomaz, just 12 years old, from Alvares Cabral, who is part of the Nebar Project and won two fourth-place finishes. Another participant who also performed very well was the fifth-best in the world in the Junior category, Jennifer Almeida, from Flamengo, who is part of the Project and won five gold medals! In the men's section, the Project rower who achieved a strong result was Bernardo Almeida of Botafogo, who was also the standout individual in the men's category of the competition, with four gold medals and one bronze.

Another very positive point of the Project is that all state centers had athletes representing the project and their clubs during the CBI and/or the North-Northeast Cup, including rowers who participated in the National Camping as the only representatives of their states.

The project had a large number of clubs across the country, including institutions that do not have state centers, but that still registered their rowers from the youth categories in the project.

The team with the largest number of rowers registered for NEBAR was Santa Catarina, with nearly one hundred athletes participating in the state camp. It's worth noting that all of the gold medals won by clubs in that state came from youth teams.

Another state that achieved its best results in the youth categories was Rio Grande do Norte.

All medals from the clubs participating in the CBI and Nebar came from rowers participating in the State Nucleus.

The Nebar Project is a huge success in Brazilian rowing, and thanks to the strong support from Brazilian clubs and their coaches, we can reap and verify these great results.

Nebar is a CBR event with support from the Ministry of Sports. Thank you to Senator Carlos Portinho for all his support of the project and our sport. Promoting and supporting the youth teams is essential for the renewal and continued development of Brazilian rowing.

6.2 NEBAR'S FIRST NATIONAL CAMPING



The First Nebar National Camping brought together 29 athletes from seven states at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas last week for a series of activities aimed at evaluating the progress of rowers from the youth categories who participated in the Project's first ranking at the beginning of the year.

But the meeting wasn't just about training. The exchanges among the Project's trainers were also crucial to the success of the first camp.

For Danilo Caduda, coach of the Sergipe team, Nebar is a fundamental tool for developing new rowers. "As a coach, I can say it was an incredible experience that taught me a lot from the other coaches and the athletes."

For Nebar's national coordinator, Roque Zimmerman, the first Nebar camp was very productive overall. The objective of the first half of the meeting was the technical development of the athletes by addressing basic tools such as warming up and mobility before the training sessions.

In the second half of the camp, the approach was more focused on how to train and seek evolution.

of training. "We want to instill in the minds of participating rowers, when they return to their clubs, the importance of mobility and warm-up throughout their rowing careers," says Roque Zimmerman.

For Ana Luiza de Souza, coach of the Rio Grande do Norte team, the NEBAR national camp provided a significant experience due to the involvement of athletes from all over Brazil. "The importance of NEBAR and the experience the project provides are essential for the development of Brazilian rowing. Many athletes traveled for the first time to participate in the camp, and it was possible to identify diverse talents, as the project encompasses rowers from all over the country," explains the coach.

The Camp, in addition to training these rowers in a healthy and positive environment and teaching the fundamentals necessary for the sustainable development of athletes, included consultations and tests with physiotherapist Rafael Jacob and nutritionist Erika Santonni.

The exchange between coaches from the state centers and the National Coordination was crucial for aligning guidelines and future training and teaching offered by Nebar. "Lectures, consultations, and training sessions were held with the participating rowers. One week was a very short period, but we are pleased with the results achieved," says Roque Zimmerman.

6.3 FIRST PARA-ROWING CT



The Brazilian Paralympic Rowing Team is training in São Paulo, where it will be based until April 15. The activities carried out on the USP track aim to prepare athletes for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games Qualifier, to be held in May, between the 19th and 21st, in Lucerne, Switzerland.

The competition will determine the final qualifiers for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games. So far, Brazil has one spot in the sport, won by rower Claudia Santos (Pinheiros) during the World Championships organized by World Rowing in September last year.

For this Training Camp, the CBR Para-Rowing Technical Coordination has selected 11 athletes. In addition to Claudia, who will compete in the second stage of the Para-Rowing World Cup, also held in Switzerland from May 24th to 26th, the team includes all the athletes scheduled to sail the Paralympic Program boats. Like Diana Barcelos

and Jairo Klug, two-time world champions in the Mix2x PR3 event (2017 and 2018), and Bahian Renê Pereira, bronze in the single scull PR1 competition at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games.

For the Coach of the Brazilian Para-Rowing Team, the Training Camp is very positive for monitoring the athletes' development and reminds us that, after the CT activities conclude, the work of the rowers and coaches of each boat doesn't end. After April 15th, the athletes return to their clubs and continue training at a competitive pace until the end of May, when they embark for Lucerne.

"Expectations are high. We hope to qualify more boats for the Paris Games. Having all the athletes gathered at the USP Racetrack is excellent because we can evaluate each one and the development of the boats as a whole," explains Fernando Carvalho.

6.4 SECOND PARA-ROWING CT

The Brazilian Para-Rowing Team has been meeting at the USP track in São Paulo since May 2nd. Athletes from all boats in the Paralympic program are training until May 12th, when they embark for the Pre-Olympic Championships to be held in Lucerne at the end of the month. Claudia Santos, PR1 1XW, already qualified for Paris, is training for the II World Cup.

"The training was great. I'm confident that we'll secure all the spots for Paris 2024," says Fernando Carvalho, coach of the Brazilian Para-Rowing Team.

According to Fernando, the mixed double PR2 has shown

evolution and lowered his time during the training sessions. Our Doctor Rene Pereira, bronze medalist in Tokyo in the PR1 single sculls, felt very good in the boat and was very happy after training this Saturday (4). The four with coxswain and the mixed double, both in the PR3 category, continue training hard.

The Brazilian Para-Rowing Team will be seeking a Paralympic berth in four boats in Lucerne: PR11xM, PR2 2xMix, PR3 2xMix, and PR3 4+Mix. Claudia Santos already qualified for Paris in the PR1 single scull last year at the World Rowing Championships. Our rower will embark a little later for the second World Rowing Cup, which will also be held in Lucerne, the week after the Pre-Olympics.



6.5 CBR AND NAVY TRAIN BACKSIDE ROWING COACHES

In January, the Brazilian Rowing Confederation, in partnership with the Admiral Adalberto Nunes Physical Education Center (CEFAN), coordinated the country's first Coastal Rowing Coach training course. Classes were taught by Professor Edson Salles. Seventeen military personnel received training in the following subjects: boat adjustment and maintenance, rowing technique, and Coach (Level 1).

Coastal Rowing, the newest Olympic sport, has entered the Program for the Los Angeles 2028 Games and the 2026 Youth Olympic Games in Senegal, in the "Beach Sprint" format.

The new modality also includes Crossing (Endurance) competitions.

In partnership with CBR, the Brazilian Navy seeks to promote the practice of grassroots projects, such as the Forces in Sport Program, train technical professionals, and develop new sports talents for High Performance who can join the Navy Olympic Program (Prolim).

Prolim, which has eight high-performance rowers among its athletes, aims to promote the development of national sports, with an emphasis on nautical and aquatic sports, in order to contribute to the transformation of Brazil into an Olympic power, strengthen the maritime mentality and project the image of the Institution.

7.1 TWO ROWERS ELECTED FOR CACOB

The Brazilian Olympic Committee's Athletes' Commission (Cacob) is set for the Los Angeles 2028 cycle.

24 names were chosen, 11 of which were women.

Two athletes from our sport, who represented us at the Olympic Games, were elected members of the Commission. Fernanda Nunes won reelection, receiving the most votes, and Lucas Verthein won his seat for the first time.

Fernanda Nunes, our representative alongside Vanessa Cozzi at Rio 2016, was re-elected for the second consecutive term as a member of CACOB, and this time she was the athlete with the most votes overall! Months later, she was elected President of CACOB by the elected members of the Commission.

Lucas Verthein, our two-time Olympic representative (Tokyo and Paris), was elected for the first time, and in a good position, among the male members of the new committee that is now being formed for the Los Angeles cycle.

The elected members will take office on the new Commission in 2025, along with the members of the Board of Directors and the President and Vice-President of the Brazilian Olympic Committee (COB). The President and Vice-President of the Athletes' Commission will be chosen by a simple majority vote through a secret ballot of the new members in an election to be scheduled and will remain in office until the end of their term.

How was the CACOB election for the Los Angeles cycle?

Angeles 2028:

The process began on July 1, when the Election Call Notice was published and the Electoral Committee was appointed. Registration of candidacies for athletes participating in the Rio 2016, Tokyo 2020, Pyeongchang 2018, and Beijing 2022 Games, as well as previous editions, took place from July 1 to 3. From July 22 to 24, candidacies for athletes competing in Paris 2024 were submitted.

On July 31, the list of pre-candidates, with 43 names, was released. On August 5, the Due Diligence process was completed by a third-party company, and the results of the verifications were submitted to the COB Integrity Committee, an integral part of the entity's Ethics Council (CECOB). The CECOB Final Report was issued on August 20, 2024, rejecting only one (1) candidacy for not meeting the eligibility criteria. The remaining candidacies were approved, totaling 42 candidates eligible to participate in the election.

Voting took place from August 26 to 30. Each eligible athlete voter received an email with their login and password to access the voting system for the 2025-2028 CACOB elections. Voters were entitled to three votes: one for a female candidate, one for a male candidate, and one for an Olympic athlete who had participated exclusively in the Olympic Games prior to Rio 2016.

With the presence of several presidents of athlete commissions from other Olympic sports, the Forum addressed important topics, both for active athletes and for representatives focused on sports management, such as: mental health, career transition, opportunities offered by the Brazilian Olympic Institute (IOB) and updates to sports legislation were some of the topics discussed.

The 5th Forum of the Athletes' Commissions of the Brazilian Olympic Movement also featured a workshop on the Athletes' Commissions' Work Plan, led by José Finocchio; and a talk by Hortência Marcari, the Queen of Brazilian basketball, present since the first formation of the COB Athletes' Commission, on "Life Lessons".

For Vanessa Cozzi, participating in the forum was a privilege. "High quality event, full of knowledge, lectures

inspiring and a great exchange of experiences with Brazilian athletes and former athletes! I can only thank CACOB for the incredible opportunity to exchange knowledge! Let's work together for the development of Olympic sports in Brazil!" says the rower.

Another rower and member of CACBR and representative of the Canoeing Athletes Commission, Estevão Lopes, an athlete from Brasília, was also present at the event.

"The dynamics have improved significantly. I've seen this evolution happening, with several relevant topics emerging in this entire representation process. We are representatives of the Athletes' Commissions; we have to absorb this content and build bridges, which is the most important thing. The content can't be left solely to us, the presidents or vice presidents of the Commissions," says Estevão.

We can expect many new developments and the application of new knowledge in the development and planning of the CBR Athletes' Commission!

Congratulations to our representatives who have engaged in the pursuit and application of new knowledge.

7.3 PANCHO PFAAB IS THE NEW HEAD COACH OF THE BRAZILIAN NATIONAL TEAM



With a strong personality and a desire to make Brazilian rowing grow, these are characteristics of the new Head Coach of the Brazilian Rowing Team. A native of Argentina, Guillermo Pfaab, better known as Pancho, has won two Olympic Games, a bronze medal at the World Championships, and three gold medals at the Pan American Games as an athlete. As a coach, he has international experience in the sport, having worked in other countries such as El Salvador and his own country.

This isn't Pancho's first national team, nor the first challenge he's faced. Methodical and systematic, he aims to change the way the Brazilian national team is thought about, selected, and trained. After taking office, the coach requested a meeting with all club coaches in Brazil to discuss and present his plans for the next Olympic cycle.

Regarding the athletes, Pancho explains: "Every victory is the rower's. Only the rower's alone. Every defeat is mine. If I am solely responsible for every defeat, the athlete has to do what I say." He adds: "The task is not easy. Each of the protagonists—rowers, clubs, federations, and the Brazilian Rowing Confederation—must agree to follow a plan so that our results are a consequence of this and not a mere rule of destiny or the combined efforts of a few.

Making a mistake in planning is planning to make a mistake."

Knowing the extreme challenge ahead, Pancho sets clear rules for the main National Rowing Team, Classic, Coastal, and Para-Rowing. The coach shares

A way to select athletes in phases and stipulate dates in the presented plan: screening, selection, crew formation, and competition. The first two phases are open to all athletes who want to apply to join the Brazilian National Team, where they will be tested on land and then in the water. The final two stages of the crew formation process are closed to rowers who qualified in the first two phases.

Youth Teams: To boost Nebar and promote the program among clubs, the Coach explains that the formation of the U-19 teams will be directly linked to the High Performance Center. The program will have three special phases, with the squads only being formed in the final phase. The phases proposed in his presentation also have distinct focuses: the first on the coach, the second on the athlete, and the third on performance.

Pancho states, in his planning and presentation to the coaches, that "the key to the successful development and maintenance of the challenge ahead is the human resources we have available. In the strictly sporting sphere, the mixed race of the Brazilian population, combined with the history of the sport, generates the exact potential to achieve our vision of leading rowing in South America."

He further asserts that willpower is the only way to achieve results, that the national spirit is what shapes and drives the sport toward good results and must be preserved, and that rowing is an individual sport with a collective effort. "Rowers must want to be on the Brazilian National Team," concludes Pancho Pfaab.

7.4 ATHLETES QUALIFIED FOR PARIS TRAIN IN ITALY



After securing a spot at the Olympic Games and competing in the II World Cup, held during the month of May at Lake Rotsee, Lucerne, athletes Beatriz Tavares and Lucas Verthein train in Varese, Italy, preparing for the third stage of the World Cup, promoted by World Rowing.

The training season in Europe is part of the athletes' preparation for the Olympics and also for the III World Cup, the last international competition for the athletes before Paris 2024. Lucas and Bia went to Italy at the end of the second stage of the competition held in Lucerne.

Lucas Verthein placed his boat among the top ten

fastest in the world in the first stage of the competition and thirteenth in the second. Bia Tavares finished fifteenth in her race.

The rowers compete in the men's and women's single sculls, the boat in which they will represent Brazil in the French capital in July.

In the Third World Cup, Lucas finished sixth in the A final. After a brief season in Brazil, continuing with training at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas, Lucas and Bia returned to Italy where they trained until the Paris Olympic Games.

7.5 SECOND YEAR OF NEBAR HAS FIVE STATE CENTERS

With the mission of supporting the development of new athletes and ensuring the country's high-level renewal for the upcoming Olympic cycles, the Rowing Base Sports Center for High Performance (NEBAR) has selected its new members. The initiative aims to continue elevating the sport with work focused on the high performance of our young athletes.

The center aims to ensure a transition for athletes from the base to high performance.

In rowing, NEBAR is held through a partnership between the National Secretariat of High Performance Sports of the Ministry of Sports, the Brazilian Navy, the Rio de Janeiro Sports Secretariat, the Brazilian Olympic Committee, and the Brazilian Confederation. This is in addition to the help, initiative, and tireless support of Senator Carlos Portinho. The goal is to provide the best training conditions for young athletes.

Nebar will operate in five different states in Brazil, three of which are in the Northeast region: Santa Catarina, Rio de Janeiro, Sergipe, Bahia, and Rio Grande do Norte. A multidisciplinary team was selected through a public notice to lead this important project, which is already a successful reality in several Olympic sports in Brazil.

Nebar's work has already begun, with the coach

Roque Zimmermann leads the project as National Coordinator, Rafael Jacob as physiotherapist, and Erika Santinoni as nutritionist. These are well-known names in the Remo community with extensive experience in their fields.

Four other coaches will work in their respective states.

Nebar's objectives are: to increase the technical level of athletes, train coaches and other professionals involved, spread the sport, ensure that athletes in the youth categories receive training that is similar to the routine of high-performance athletes, keeping them always motivated and conditioning them for national and international competitions.

7.7 ITALIAN COACH HOLDS WORKSHOP DURING BRAZILIAN BEACH SPRINT

Invited by the Brazilian Rowing Confederation, Dario Femminò is in the country to closely follow the first national championship of the new Olympic sport.

A specialist in the new Olympic sport, which will be part of the Los Angeles 2028 program, Dario came to Brazil at the invitation of the Brazilian Rowing Confederation (CBR) to give a workshop to Brazilian coaches and closely monitor the interclub competition.

"Brazil, due to its geography and the characteristics of its athletes, with a very diverse population, has great potential in coastal rowing. For me, this new Olympic sport can bring many excellent opportunities to Brazil and its athletes. They have the physical characteristics to excel in this new discipline. It is an honor to witness this wonderful first Brazilian Coastal Rowing Championship."

Dario holds a PhD in Movement Sciences and is a coach at one of Italy's leading rowing clubs, in the Sicily region. His resume includes titles such as the 2021 World Championships in Lisbon and

Barletta in 2023, in addition to a silver and two bronze medals in this type of competition. At the European Championships, he has four gold medals and one bronze.

"I see Brazilian athletes and coaches very interested in learning more about backstroke rowing.

The competition has a lot of participants, from major clubs to smaller ones. I'm learning a lot too. It's always good to have this exchange of experiences. There's always time to learn," Dario emphasized.

"I think it's a good idea, as it's a category with much greater visibility as a spectacle. Everything is very close to the public, and you can watch the entire competition. It's a sport that brings more adrenaline, and I believe that the success of Los Angeles 2028 will ensure that beach rowing remains on the Olympic program," Dario predicts.

The 42-year-old Italian coach speaks fluent Portuguese. He studied the language for three months in Portugal and then went to Mozambique, where he spent nine months volunteering with disadvantaged children.

8.1 SPECIAL WOMEN'S DAY

Female leadership and Brazilian rowing

Twenty years ago, if today's scenario were dreamed of, it would have been just another dream among many others. A scenario of gender equality in national championships, the first woman elected president of the Brazilian Rowing Confederation, another woman elected president of the CBR Athletes' Commission, and another rower elected president of the COB Athletes' Commission.

This is in a sport where women were only welcomed into the Olympic program almost 100 years after rowing's first appearance at the Olympic Games, at the 1979 Montreal Olympics. The sport's governing body, FISA, now World Rowing, was founded even before the International Olympic Committee. The organization's first women's committee was only created in 1969.

In Brazil, the First Brazilian Women's Rowing Championship took place in the early 1980s, at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas, together with the Brazilian Junior Rowing Trophy, and there were only two events: the single skiff and the double skiff.

In the same decade, the first women's event in South American championships also took place at Lagoa Rodrigo de Freitas, albeit unofficially, with only Brazilian athletes participating.

First Elected President: Magali Moreira was already well-known in the international rowing community when she became the first elected president of the Brazilian Rowing Confederation. She is the fourth generation of her family to work, lead, and love the sport of rowing. She began as a national referee, a South American referee (CSAR), a world referee (World Rowing), and the first female president of the Federation of Regatta Clubs of Bahia.

Coordinator during Rio 2016, ITO referee during Tokyo 2020, CBR referee coordinator for over a decade, referee trainer, including the first three World Rowing referees in the history of Brazilian Rowing.

Magali is also responsible for bringing the first World Rowing championship to Brazil, the 2025 World Rowing Beach Sprint Finals, which will be held on Flamengo Beach in October, in Rio de Janeiro. The first Brazilian Interclub Championship with gender equality was also held during the president's first term, as one of her first actions in office, in the first year of her administration.

With the support of Senator Carlos Portinho, from Rio de Janeiro, Magali implemented five state centers of Nebar (Training Center for Base Categories for High Performance) and also centers to promote Para-Rowing in different states of Brazil.

The first medal in the single sculls at the 2023 Pan American Games came under the president's administration. Lucas Verthein not only won the event's first medal, but also broke the 36-year drought in the sport.

Magali created a new policy at the helm of the CBR, with a management that transformed gender equality from a mere concept into a reality. State rowing gained new development centers, and the humanization of athletes became a key element in the new communication policies. The CBR's technical coordination also changed with the hiring of Head Coach Pancho Pfaab to lead the Brazilian National Team.

The swimmer who learned to row: During President Magali's first term,

The CBR Athletes' Commission was led by another woman, Olympic rower Vanessa Cozzi. The athlete, our representative at Rio 2016, took over the CACBR and has emerged as one of the new leaders in national rowing. Multiple times Brazilian and South American champion, she started in the sport a little later, due to her husband, Dr. Renan Koplewski de Castro.

Despite her late start, Vanessa made it to the Brazilian National Team, the South American Championships, and the Olympic Games. She once again became Brazilian rowing champion at the last Unified IBC, held in São Paulo in 2024. As head of the CACBR, the rower faced several challenges, including complaints from rowers. Undaunted by her work, the representative, along with the other members of the commission, defended the rowers and sought clarity and impartiality in her decisions and actions. Thus, she became one of the greatest female leaders on the national stage.

rowed solo at Rio 2016, alongside her was Fernanda Nunes. The two competed together in the lightweight women's double sculls, Brazil's last Olympic appearance in that boat. The CACBR president's partner was recently elected president of CACOB (the Brazilian Olympic Committee's Athletes' Commission).

Fernanda has just taken office, but the Vasco da Gama and Navy athlete is in her second term as a member of CACOB and has also served on the CBR Athletes' Commission and is part of the Athletes for Brazil movement. The Olympian, like Vanessa, participated in the last Brazilian Championship, but her most recent international achievements were in the Beach Sprint.

The rower won a silver medal in the mixed double sculls and a gold medal in the endurance event at the last Copa America. This year, while many were celebrating Carnival, our athlete was training with the Brazilian National Coastal Rowing Team at Flamengo Beach.

8.2 SPECIAL WITH OUTSTANDING ATHLETES OF THE CBI AND SEASON

Jairo Klug and Alina Dumas from Olympic rowing to be our representatives in the Paralympics

Athletes change categories, whether weight or age, but two Brazilian rowers changed disciplines.

Alina Dumas (Corinthians) and Jairo Klug (Pinheiros) started in Olympic rowing and, for different reasons, today, they are classified as para-athletes and are part of the Paralympic rowing team in the PR3 category.

Jairo was part of the Olympic rowing team and represented us at the Pan American and South American Games before suffering a serious motorcycle accident in 2010, from which the rower still carries the after-effects in his left hand.

The athlete says the consequences of the accident weren't worse precisely because he was already a high-performance athlete, and his muscles didn't allow the cervical vertebrae, fractured during the motorcycle crash, to move out of place. After months in the hospital and weeks in a coma, the rower woke up without knowing what had happened to him.

"I woke up in the hospital's ICU without knowing anything about what had happened. To this day, my last memory of that day is saying goodbye to the people at USP, after a rowing session and leaving on my motorcycle," recalls Jairo.

Our sister, naturalized Brazilian, Alina Dumas, switched to para-rowing after undergoing ligament reconstruction surgery in her legs. "The surgery is very simple, routine. My right ankle is fine, with no after-effects, but my left is stiffer, and I can't flex it as much as I used to. So, I tried twice to qualify for PR3. The doctors think my condition might improve, but I'm in a lot of pain, and if I have to undergo any surgery, it will be to remove the nerve," explains the athlete.

With very different career starts, Jairo and Alina were our Paralympic representatives in Paris in two boats. The Pinheiros rower competed in the PR3 double sculls alongside Diana Barcelos, achieving Brazil's highest finish at the Paris Games: fifth overall in the PR3 double sculls final.

The transition: Although the rowers' bodies bear the aftereffects of accidents or surgeries, both athletes are doing very well in their new status as para-athletes. For Alina and Jairo, the transition was smooth, and the reason was the same: their love for rowing.

"I waited a year of physical therapy to find out if my injury would be permanent or not. I remember that at the time the Pinheiros para-rowing coach even joked: worst case scenario, you come row with us! At the time, I could have stopped, but I love rowing and one way to stay competitive and do what I love was to try to qualify. That's what I did and I continue training to this day," explains our representative and two-time Paralympic athlete, Jairo Klug.

"I have a lot of fun rowing and I train to compete. In Olympic rowing, I have to compensate a bit for my limited movement; I have to open my legs a bit wider. My stroke isn't perfect, but in para-rowing, I feel more comfortable. Qualifying for PR3 was the right thing to do, even though I've done it twice and will have to review it at the start of next season," explains our representative in Paris, Alina Dumas.

Outstanding rowers in both disciplines, Alina Dumas and Jairo Klug show that their love for sport and competition has made them persist and continue training and that, despite the changes, their athlete mentality and desire to train remain unshakeable.



8.3 CBI 2024: STATE RIVALRIES THAT BECOME NATIONAL UNION

The Brazilian Interclub Championship was notable for the large number of participating clubs and athletes. Every region of the country was represented in the largest competition on the national rowing calendar. The competition lasted six days, with 99 events across rowing and para-rowing. Flamengo was the season's champion, lifting the Olympic and Paralympic rowing titles.

Despite the large number of entrants, many participants had to band together to compete in the longboat finals. In twelve events, the highlight was boats formed between clubs with centuries-old rivalries in their states.

Teams that demonstrate that rowing moves athletes, institutions, waters, boats, and fans. And look how some of these teams made it to the podium!

Speaking of unity, Grêmio Náutico União (GNU), Guaíba Porto Alegre (GPA), and Centro Português Primeiro de Dezembro all delivered a masterclass at this CBI. After facing the worst environmental tragedy ever experienced in Rio Grande do Sul, the clubs decided to help each other participate in this CBI. To increase the representation of Rio Grande do Sul, several mixed teams were assembled. There were eight events in which the clubs from Rio Grande do Sul pooled their resources to participate, winning five medals: one gold, two silver, and two bronze! All in women's events.

If the subject is centuries-old rivalry, there is a state in the country that stands out for its super regattas

fierce competitions and fans who are more than passionate about their clubs. We're talking about Pará. At this CBI, the unlikely happened: a mixed team formed by athletes from Clube do Remo and Paysandu in the men's under-19 four-sculls, and it worked! The youngsters showed that sport also stirs passions and took second place, climbing to the podium to receive the silver medal in this Brazilian championship!

Another team formed in this CBI by rival clubs came from the Northeast region, Clube Náutico Capibaribe (CNC) and Sport Club Recife (SCR), in the men's lightweight double sculls, taking home the silver medal! During the Copa Norte, Sport and Náutico combined for first and second place on the Championship podium and won the A Tarde Cup for the Pernambuco Rowing Federation. This CBI extended the partnership, resulting in a silver medal for the clubs.

Another mixed team, which yielded a bronze medal for two rival clubs in the state championship, came from Santa Catarina. Clube Náutico America and Riachuelo joined forces with Vasco da Gama from Rio de Janeiro and took third place in the men's under-19 helmsman eight event.

Also joining this CBI, setting aside state differences, were the teams from the Federal District: Remo Brasília and Crossrowing. The team from the nation's capital rowed together and strong in the senior women's four sculls on the eve of the Brasília state championship category finals. The women put aside their differences and finished fifth in the event.

8.2 HALL OF FAME SPECIAL: OGUENER TISSOT

You know that guy who falls in love at first sight and finds the inspiring muse of a lifetime?

You know that restless, resilient guy with good energy who dedicates himself completely, who inspires and infects everyone, and lives and dies for an idea and an ideal? You know that guy with attitude who loves what he does and charms everyone wherever he goes?

This was Oguener Tissot, the one-man army who made training athletes his legacy for rowing and left several generations of rowers orphaned by his passing. However, despite the sadness and profound loss, his love for the sport and his example, both in life and in life, are the great legacies of this master who achieved so much with so little.

Always restless, Oguener already demonstrated the leadership and resilience traits that would become hallmarks of his work and personality in rowing. Silvia says he was very inquisitive and enjoyed being surrounded by people, his friends, always creating an opportunity or event to bring everyone together and always willing to help anyone in need.

Love at first sight: Oguener's rowing story began when he was a kid in Pelotas. He tried out several sports before finding rowing at Náutico Gaúcho. The coach's mother, Silvia Tissot, remembers that the boy wasn't old enough when he joined the club and had to wait a few years to join the sport. "His older brother started rowing and soon stopped. Oguener was upset because he really wanted to join but couldn't because he was so young," the coach's mother laughs, recalling the episode.

The first trace of resilience was there, waiting for a while before he turned 12 and started rowing. It wasn't long before Oguener was already out rowing with younger athletes just starting out in the sport.

Leadership that comes from home: Oguener Tissot has always been a person who cared about others. Dona Silvia remembers that, long before he got involved in rowing or sports, he was always surrounded by school friends, doing some activity, and every now and then, he would ask his mother to make Nescau for the street kids or children from underprivileged communities who came to play with him.

Oguener was a person who inspired others from childhood, whether through play or with his ever-large circle of friends, as his mother recalls. "Sometimes there were so many children, and he'd ask me to make sandwiches and Nescau, and I'd think, 'I'll have to buy a dairy cow to keep up,'" Dona Silvia recalls fondly.

The role of leader never intimidated Oguener, who always stood out and influenced others. A close friend and caring person, they knew they could trust him. Rowing was no different. After he began mentoring less experienced athletes, the then-rower began teaching at Náutico Gaúcho, and it was there that the desire to develop social projects for youth teams emerged.

Vigilante Mirim and Rowing Against the Tide: Before conceiving Rowing for the Future, but always armed with a smile, chimarrão, and a vision, Oguener Tissot had two other projects. The first was "Vigilantes Mirins," developed in partnership with Petrobras, for children with family problems and from underprivileged communities. Rowing lessons were held at the Náutico Gaúcho headquarters, and Oguener's first students began to appear and excel.

The Vigilantes Mirins (Children's Watchers) lasted two years, and shortly after the agreement with Petrobras ended, Oguener launched his second project, "Rowing Against the Tide," in partnership with private companies. The project didn't last long, but it was there that he met his then-student and later longtime friend Fernanda Schwartz, who, along with another Rowing Against the Tide athlete, Taise Mondim, became Oguener's first rowers to win medals and stand out on the state stage.

Another rower who emerged from the same project was Victor Ruzicki, who competed for the Brazilian team at the Pan American Games in Toronto in 2015, achieving an honorable fourth place in the two-man unmanned sculls.

Rowing for the Future with an Eye on the Present: The Rowing Against the Tide Project didn't last long, and there was Oguener Tissot once again dreaming up another project—this one, according to the coach's mother, would be the apple of his eye. In partnership with the City Hall and the Federal University of Pelotas, and in a new home, the Centro Português Primeiro de Dezembro, Oguener would create one of the largest athlete development projects today.

A lot with very little: Armed with an ergometer and his passion for sport, Oguener would recruit his students by giving lectures at public schools and would immediately pass on his love for the sport to these students and inspire aspiring rowers that sport is an effective tool for changing realities and lives. "The athletes' eyes light up when they talk about him. He is a leader who inspires and infects those around him," explains Fernanda Schwartz.

Not only does it inspire its students, but an entire community, as the boathouse in Portuguese Center was built through

donations from the community itself and local businesses because people believed in Oguener's work and leadership, as Fernanda explains. "People are infected by him. Oguener has great energy. Everyone enjoys being around him," comments the master athlete and Remar for the Future collaborator.

Despite not having a degree in physical education, Oguener was a World Rowing Level 2 coach and, alongside Professor Fabricio Boscolo from the University of Pelotas, developed the Rowing for the Future Project, studying the physiology of the sport and great coaches in the sport and the work methodology of each one.

Believes in the Process: One thing no one doubts is Oguener's passion for rowing, his ability to coach the sport to young people, and his resilience to overcome challenges. Tissot accumulated friends, experiences, students, and excellent results over the years, and his athletes increasingly excelled on the national and international scene, whether rowing alongside Tissot in the youth ranks or for larger clubs when they turned 18.

Countless rowers have started with the Project. Six generations of athletes. A legacy of love built throughout life until the very last minute.

This was Master Oguener Tissot, who needs to be remembered, celebrated, and never forgotten by this community. A one-man army.

During World War II, it is estimated that Brazil received 75,000 refugees who came with their families from the European continent, from various countries. Between 1947 and 1951, according to Diversitas – Center for the Study of Diversity, Intolerance, and Conflict – USP, the country received 25,000 immigrants. In 1948, a joint commission was formed in Brazil (the IR) (Decree 25,796 of November 10, 1948), under which the Brazilian government committed to receiving a quota of displaced persons, although the country had already been receiving them since the beginning of the conflict.

The European population endured six years of suffering during World War II, followed by decades of families struggling to survive the damage and catastrophic consequences of the military conflict. Brazil was going through a delicate moment in its own national politics. When World War II broke out in September 1939, our country was experiencing the Estado Novo (New State), the dictatorship of Getúlio Vargas. Congress had been closed, political parties had been dissolved, and the president relied on the support of the military.

Even so, Brazil was the only country in South America to send soldiers under its own flag. Brazilian participation in the war began in 1942, with the breaking of diplomatic relations with the Axis and the sending of troops in June 1944. There were approximately 25,000 soldiers who fought on the northern Italian battlefield, called the Brazilian Expeditionary Force (FEB), according to the book "The Brazilians and the Second World War" by Cesar Ferraz.

Throughout history, Brazil has received approximately 1.5 million immigrants, of which approximately 650,000 are displaced persons or asylum seekers, according to information taken from the Chamber of Deputies Portal. Some arrived due to tragic times of military, political, and economic hardship in their countries and the consequences of World War II, also becoming refugees.

reasons for armed conflict.

Is rowing necessary? During this period in world history, the Olympics were suspended for two editions and Germany was banned from participating for two Olympic cycles, one of several sanctions the country received at the end of the conflict.

Among the thousands of refugees Brazil welcomed, many were very young children, and they found in our territory more than a second home or a second homeland; they found a country to defend and respect. Some of these young Europeans became naturalized Brazilians and found in rowing a reason to love Brazil and honor the colors of our flag.

Edgard Gijsen: Born in Antwerp, Belgium, on January 29, 1940, he was his parents' youngest child and arrived in Brazil in 1943, according to his family. He began his career years later at Grêmio Náutico União, in Rio Grande do Sul, becoming a Brazilian champion while representing the club. A few years later, he moved to Rio de Janeiro, where he played for Vasco da Gama and Flamengo.

The athlete was better known as Belga, a nickname he acquired in the sport. To compete for the Brazilian national team, the rower sought Brazilian citizenship and became a four-time South American champion alongside Harry Klein and a South American single sculls champion. Edgard Gijsen was one of the Brazilian rowers of his generation who won the most titles for the country and participated in Brazil's best Pan American Games campaign to date.

The Belgian won three other medals in Pan American Games, one silver and

two bronze medals. In South American competitions, he reached the podium nine times, with five gold medals and four silver medals.

Alongside Harry Klein, Edgard won one of the first three Pan American medals in Brazilian rowing history at the 1971 Pan American Games in Cali, Colombia. He also achieved a creditable sixth place in the A final at the 1970 World Rowing European Championships, a first for Brazilian rowing.

Edgard Gijsen also represented us at the 1968 Mexico Olympic Games, where he came first in the B final, the best Brazilian placement in the Olympics in the men's double sculls (2xM) event, to this day.

The Melis Brothers: The Dutch brothers, Johannes Hendrikus Theodorus Wilhelms Melis and Ruthgerus Hermann Hendrikus Johanna Melis, born in Roermond, came to Brazil with their families as children, aged eight and nine, respectively. Like the Belgian, they became naturalized Brazilians and represented the Brazilian rowing team. They began their careers at Grêmio Náutico União, where they excelled on the team.

The Melis brothers' immigration story unfolds at the end of the war, when the family was rescued from a bunker by American soldiers. During World War II, the future rowers' father, Hendrikus Ruthgerus Melis, played a pivotal role in the small town of Roermond, on the banks of the Meuse River, rescuing and hiding Jewish families and a Canadian soldier whose plane had been shot down.

The family went through all the drama and trauma imposed by World War II before migrating on a ship to Rio de Janeiro.

The boys' father was a war hero

decorated by Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands for his work and also received a letter of thanks from the American President at the time, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1958, brothers Johannes and Ruthgerus became Brazilian citizens after winning the national rowing championships with Grêmio Náutico União. That same year, they were called up to compete for Brazil in the 5th South American Championship. Wearing the green and yellow uniform, they brought the championship title home to the country, rowing as a pair without a coxswain.

Iosif Landau: Born in 1924 in Bucharest, Romania, Iosif Landau arrived in Rio in 1940 with his parents and sister, fleeing Nazism. Coming from a family of Jewish origin, liberation from the German dictatorship made the rower a Brazilian at heart, an honorary citizen of Rio. He began rowing in England in 1938, when he attended a boys' boarding school called Maiden Erlegh School, near the River Thames.

Iosif tells his life story and how he came to Brazil in 1940 in his book: Tumultuous Memory.

Arriving in Rio de Janeiro, he became a rower for Botafogo. He never rowed for the national team. Married to a Brazilian woman, he had four children, one of them the economist and lawyer Elena Landau.

Due to his work, the rower had to travel to other states and left Rio de Janeiro for the interior of São Paulo, which is why his rowing career in Brazil was short-lived. His passion for Botafogo and rowing never waned. He even wrote a poem, an Ode of Love to the sport, and ran a website featuring third-party and original articles about the sport.

In 2009, unfortunately, Iosif passed away, leaving behind a wife, children, grandchildren and a legacy of love for rowing, Botafogo and Brazil.

incluir modificação em nossa opinião, se as divulgações forem inadequadas. Nossas conclusões estão fundamentadas nas evidências de auditoria obtidas até a data de nosso relatório. Todavia, eventos ou condições futuras podem levar a Entidade a não mais se manter em continuidade operacional.

- Avaliamos a apresentação geral, a estrutura e o conteúdo das demonstrações contábeis, inclusive as divulgações e se as demonstrações contábeis representam as correspondentes transações e os eventos de maneira compatível com o objetivo de apresentação adequada.

Comunicamo-nos com os responsáveis pela governança a respeito, entre outros aspectos, do alcance e da época dos trabalhos de auditoria planejados e das constatações significativas de auditoria, inclusive sobre possíveis deficiências significativas nos controles internos que, eventualmente, poderiam ter sido identificadas durante nossos trabalhos.
